TALLAHASSEE — Governor Jeb Bush recently appointed Michael W. Andrew, Jr., of Orlando, to the Governor's Commission on Volunteerism and Community Service, commonly called Volunteer Florida. Andrew will serve a three-year term.

Andrew is Vice President and Senior Counsel for Marriott International, where he is responsible for government relations and compliance for Marriott Vacation Club International's vacation ownership, timeshare and residential real property brands, overseeing legal support for Marriott's lending operations related to these areas, and participating in strategic vacation product initiatives.

Prior to joining Marriott in 1999, Andrew worked in the Orlando offices of Holland & Knight, LLP and Taylor & Carls, P.A. He is active in his community, and currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Boys and Girls Club of Central Florida, teaches in the StreetLaw Program, and is an appointee of Governor Jeb Bush to the Florida Advisory Council on Condominiums. In addition, Andrew is an active supporter of Marriott's Spirit to Serve volunteerism program.

Andrew earned his law degree, with honors, from Stetson University College of Law and a bachelor's degree with honors, from the University of Florida. He and his wife, Dr. Dawn Andrew, are the proud parents of three children, Michael, Victoria and Reagan.

The Commission grants funds to Florida AmeriCorps and National Service programs; encourages volunteerism for everyone from youths to seniors to people with disabilities; promotes volunteerism in emergency management and preparedness; and helps to strengthen and expand Volunteer Centers in Florida.

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
