

**2020-2021 Florid Disaster Fund Long Term Recovery Grantees  
Hurricane Irma**

<b>Organization</b>	<b>Recommended Award</b>	<b>Project Summary</b>
International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC)	\$128,707.00	IOCC delivered almost \$400,000 in services in order to assist Hurricane Irma survivors with home building and repair.
Rebuilding Together Tampa Bay Inc (RTTB)	\$783,894.76	RTTB's Disaster Recovery Home Repair Project repaired and rebuilt Irma-impacted homes including repair or replacement of roofs, soffit, fascia, and drywall in addition to preventative work to ensure the impacted home can stay dry and in a safe and livable condition, able to withstand a future environmental disasters. The target population was low and moderate-income homeowners residing in Hillsborough and Pinellas Counties in Florida. The project will serve at least 55 homeowners that meet eligibility criteria
Samuel's House / dba: KeysStrong.Org	\$300,000.00	Samuel's House provided 110 families / households in the County; providing disaster case management as well as collaboration via partnership agreement with Kids Come First of the Florida Keys, Inc, to provide the same services, to a minimum of 48 school-aged children (0-22) in the County. They served at total of 158 families.
The Business and Technology Development Corporation	\$360,149.00	The Business and Technology Development Corporation provided disaster case management to secure housing for 100 families through the Emergency Tarp Program and addressed the unmet needs of 25 homes, through roof and AC repair, debris removal, and other needs as identified through the case manager.
The Nonprofit Center of Northeast FL for Northeast Florida Long-Term Recovery Organization (NFLTRO)	\$450,000.00	Funding allowed NFLTRO's home repair program to continue beyond 10 cases to address the repairs of the 51 families that remained in queue. The limited home repair program is designed to bring homes back to a safe, sanitary, and secure condition.
Treasure Coast Food Bank (TCFB)	\$125,000.00	TCFB helped 150 to 200 low-income households with recovery from the impacts of Hurricane Irma. TCF utilized a comprehensive and holistic approach to identify and address the unique challenges each household faces.
United Way of Broward County	\$426,452.22	United Way of Broward County encouraged long-term residency, stability by increasing the number of safe and healthy housing units in order to be secure for the next hurricane event through making repairs and improving structures of target residents - the elderly, disabled, veterans, and families with children and other homeowners who show a commitment to make a sustainable change in their lives.
United Way Of Collier County Inc	\$322,934.00	United Way of Collier County provided disaster case management for at least 30 Collier County survivor households by rebuilding the damaged portions of their houses.
Volusia Interfaiths Agencies Networking in Disaster (VIND)	\$954,625.00	VIND identified nineteen clients to reach and achieve recovery. These clients have had their homes repaired/rebuilt and mobile homes replaced/relocated. Clients no longer reside in unsafe and unhealthy environments.

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Bay District Schools	\$440,000.00	Bay District Schools hired 30 volunteer liaisons who were responsible for recruiting volunteers to act as mentors to students, as well as recruiting businesses or individuals to provide for student basic and school needs.
Be Ready Alliance Coordinating for Emergencies (BRACE)	\$100,000.00	BRACE addressed the need for capacity-building and support services for long term recovery efforts in the 12 counties that received a major disaster declaration for Hurricane Michael. The funding allowed BRACE to provide coaching, training, and mentoring support for Long Term Recovery Groups to improve their effectiveness in assisting survivors with their recovery.
Federal Alliance for Safe Homes, Inc. (FLASH)	\$645,000.00	FLASH, in partnership with the Alabama-West Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church (AWFC), will rebuilt six Hurricane Michael-damaged homes in Bay and Gulf Counties. The six homes were provided to families with unmet economic needs due to gaps in public and private insurance or other types of support.
Feeding the Gulf Coast	\$95,000.00	Feeding the Gulf Coast provided an additional 583,000 meals to households struggling with hunger and increase access to nutritious food for the most vulnerable populations in Holmes, Washington, and Holmes counties. It also unencumbered \$1.9 million in household income as hurricane survivors continually work to rebuild their lives
Gulf Specimen Marine Laboratories, Inc.(GSML)	\$485,000.00	GSML created a new parking area, on undeveloped land, to provide an area for school buses to safely unload students that are visiting the facility, as well as adequate space for guests to park. In addition, GSML constructed a new education facility to provide staff with the necessary space to conduct educational programs for thousands of students and visitors each year.
Habitat for Humanity of Bay County, FL	\$350,000.00	Habitat for Humanity of Bay County provided critical home repairs for at least 40 low to moderate income families that suffered damage due to Hurricane Michael. These repairs had an overall repair cost budget of \$200,000 at a projected average of \$5,000 repair.
Homeless and Hunger Coalition of NWFL (Doorways of NWFL)	\$200,000.00	Doorways of NWFL provided disaster case management for 104 families / households in Bay, Calhoun, Gulf, Holmes, Jackson and Washington Counties, as well as collaboration via a partnership agreement with Rebuild Bay County Inc. (RBCI), to provide nutritional and basic needs services to a minimum of 50 families/households who were homebound or unable to secure these resources for themselves due to disability, elderly and in poor health, lack of transportation, care-takers with extremely large foster families and those referred through crisis counselors.
North Florida Inland Long Term Recovery, Inc.	\$110,000.00	North Florida Inland Recovery Group, Inc. hired Project/Volunteer Coordinators who will work with rebuilding efforts to develop budgets, assessments, schedules, and other tasks necessary to support their efforts.
Rebuild Bay County, Inc. (RBCI)	\$250,000.00	RBCI assisted at least 50 Bay county households by providing minor home repairs, household goods and furniture, construction coordination, and other costs required to return families to their homes, with an emphasis on the school-based population and residents in FEMA direct housing.
Sleep in Heavenly Peace, Inc	\$120,000.00	SHP Disaster Relief team and local SHP chapter leadership organized a public build where volunteers built over 700 beds. The Disaster Relief team then coordinated the delivery of all 700 beds to children in need throughout the Bay County area.
