More than 30 active CERT programs have been deployed to support response operations in over two dozen counties impacted by hurricanes and other emergencies. These dedicated volunteers have contributed thousands of hours to shelter operations, wellness checks, debris removal, and neighborhood outreach —playing a pivotal role in restoring stability and strengthening community resilience across the state.


Mobilizing Local Resources: A Community Strategy



The Florida Disaster Fund supported robust CERT efforts this quarter, strengthening state preparedness and response. Through training, outreach, and deployments, CERT volunteers showed extraordinary commitment to service and safety in their communities.



LOCAL IMPACT SNAPSHOT:

Bay County CERT: Assisted 230 residents during a water contamination emergency, graduated 13 new members, and participated in a mass casualty training with 29 agencies and 125 responders.



COMMUNITY INITIATIVES



City of Tampa CERT: Hosted a Basic Training course with 8 new members and engaged 19 volunteers in hurricane support roles.



Jefferson County CERT: Supported post-Hurricane Helene cleanup, EOC call-taking, and traffic control, donating 128 volunteer hours.



Town of Davie CERT: Launched a new CERT Academy training 70 participants over 4 weeks and maintained mentorship programming.


